The car is powered by an Enya .15 model airplane ongine bolted to an aluminum frame made from 1 X 3 inch strips, according to Barnes. The axles are inch steel rods, with the rear wheels connected by direct-drive gears to the ongine.

The front axle has individual wheel suspension, Barnes said, "similar to arm suspensions on IVI race cars." The body is styrofoam plastic, coated with a sleek red finish of metal-set material simil-

ar to epoxy.

"I traded one of the guys in the detachment for the ongine, "Barnes said, "and the rest of the parts came from an old Tachometer generator and a windshield wiper motor. I got the gears, springs for the suspension and bearings from them." Brass parts, he added, were made, from an old' 105mm howitzer shell
